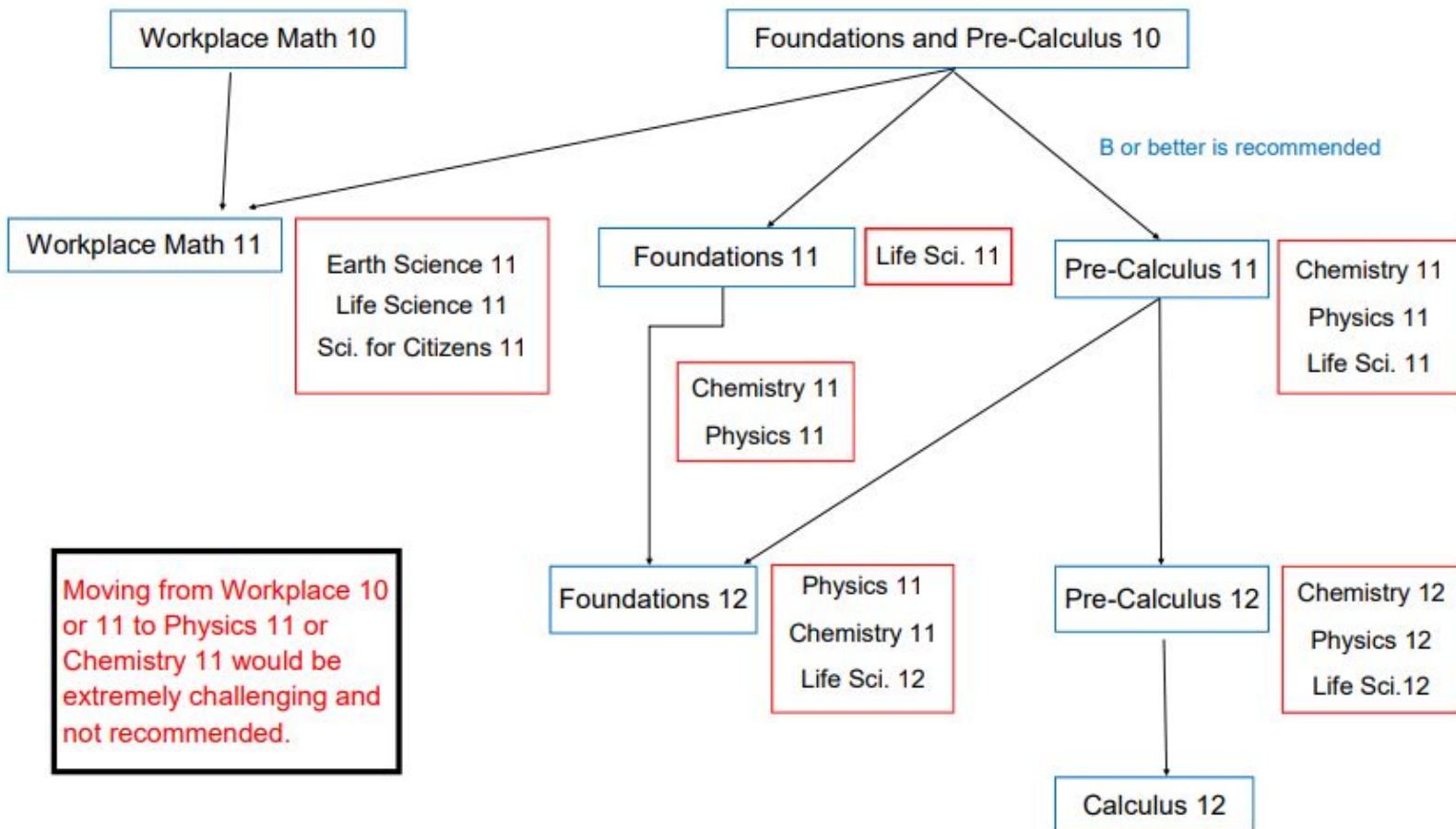

English / Literary Studies 11/12 MLTST11, MLTST12

Students will explore specific themes, periods, authors, or areas of the world through literary works (fiction and non-fiction) in a variety of media.

Some areas of focus may include:

- literature by era (Middle Ages, Renaissance, Restoration, Romantic, Victorian, 20th century)
- Canadian, world, and First Peoples literature

English / Media 11/12 MNMD-11, MNMD-12

English / Media 11/12 is an English course that recognizes the expanding role of technology and digital communication. Coursework allows students to demonstrate understanding, learning, and communication through a variety of media.

Some areas of focus may include:

- influence of media – current events, propaganda, advocacy
- journalism and publishing – short stories, non-fiction novels, critical and creative thinking, essays
- digital communication – blogging, post writing, media stories, research

English / Spoken Language & Storytelling 11/12 MSPLG11, MSPLG12

English / Spoken Language & Storytelling 11/12 students will study, create, write, and present original and authentic pieces for a range of purposes. Students will expand their competencies through processes of drafting, reflecting, and revising bodies of work.

Some areas of focus may include:

- spoken word/slam poetry, poetry recitation, oral storytelling, readers' theatre, radio/podcasts/video posts
- local story knowledge, oral history
- speech writing/presenting, proposals, interviewing, event facilitation, radio/podcasts/video posts (information items), voice-overs

English / Creative Writing 11/12 MCTWR11 MCTWR12

Students will read and write across many genres of writing, such as non-fiction writing (journalism, academic writing) and many aspects of fiction writing (poetry, short stories, children's literature). Students will gain exposure to new and classic literature as well as First People's Literature throughout the course.

Some areas of focus may include:

- academic writing (research and persuasive essay writing)
- journalism (photo and written journalism)
- children's literature
- short prose fiction (short stories)
- poetry

Social Studies

Explorations in Social Studies 11 MEPSS11

Recommended Prerequisites: Social Studies 10 **Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.**

This class includes a variety of themes and issues from all fields in Social Studies.

Content includes:

- social, cultural, or technological innovations in the 20th: **history**
- issues for indigenous people in Canada and around the world: **indigenous studies**
- Current issues: **political studies**
- natural resource use: **human geography**
- global cultures: **comparative cultures**
- rights in Canada: **law**
- methods in social justice: Social **Justice**
- sacred texts, traditions, and narratives of cultures: **World Religions**
- responses to genocide: **Genocide Studies**
- issues in urbanization: **Urban Studies**

BC First Peoples 12 MBCFP12

Recommended Prerequisites: SS10

The study of the history, culture and literature/art of the native people in Canada in 4 units.

Careers in Indigenous Studies: law, band chief, archeology, anthropology, teacher, police, social work

- carrier history, language and culture
- metis history & culture, overview of North American tribal areas
- impact of residential schooling and missionary activity
- art/literature - traditional art (totems, petroglyphs, masks), media portrayal (older movies vs. current ones)
- first nations Literature including folk tales and modern stories

Comparative Cultures 12 MCMCL12

Recommended Prerequisites: SS10

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

This course is a study of the inter-relationships among art, culture and civilization. It will examine key beliefs and values of cultures over time through hands on approach.

Careers in Cultural Studies: Arts, Social Work, Language Studies, Film, Theatre, Music, Public Service, Teaching

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

Areas of study:

- art
- origins of Civilization
- myth and early religion
- monuments of Civilization
- fashion
- culture
- technology
- philosophy
- food
- music

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

This course is **University Transferable** and introduces students to a range of Geography with emphasis on physical and human approaches. Geography is ideal for students interested in Environmental studies, forestry, Humanities and Global Issues. This thought provoking course not only helps students understand their world better but is a stepping stone to dozens of careers.

Careers in Geography: Forestry, Urban Planning, Education, Business, Environmental Consultant, Ecologist, Health Services, Meteorologist, Oil/Gas Industry, Real-estate

This course is split into 2 parts.

The world around you:

- atmosphere: climate, weather
- earth's surface :Geomorphology, glaciers, river systems, plate tectonics
- biosphere: Biomes, energy, environment
- topographic Maps

Humans Impact on the Environment:

- climate change
- acid precipitation
- ozone depletion
- over population
- sewage treatments
- problems with landfills, mining, forestry, and fishing.



Social Studies

History 12 MWH--12

Prerequisites: SS 10

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

This is an in-depth study of the world of the 20th century with particular emphasis on Europe and Asia.

A variety of strategies are used in this course including: Role play, Debates, Small group discussions, Oral presentations.

We will be exploring and employing the Big Six Historical concepts.

Career options in History: teaching, political science, law, journalism, curator, international studies, commerce, diplomacy, CSIS

Particular emphasis in the course includes:

- the Paris Peace Conference of 1919
- failure of the League of Nations
- the Russian Revolution
- the rise of the dictators: Mussolini, Stalin and Hitler
- causes of World War II
- Europe and Asia theatres of war
- Europe / Pacific
- nuclear war and weapons
- the Cold War Conflicts (Berlin, Korea, Cuba, Vietnam, the Middle East)
- the United Nations
- the Middle East (creation of Israel and wars with Palestine, Iran-Iraq war, Gulf War, 9/11 and Al Qaeda, USA led invasions, Syria, and ISIS)
- end of the Cold War
- towards a United Europe
- post Cold War: New World Order 1989-2018 (NATO and the new Russia under Putin)
- Present and future conflicts and issues (Trump's USA and its implications)

Recommended Prerequisites: SS10

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

This is a survey course of law in Canada. This academic course is suited to students interested in pursuing a career in law and for general knowledge about the Canadian legal system, including the Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the treatment of and laws surrounding First Peoples.

Careers in Law: policing, corrections, probation and parole officer, sheriff, legal secretary, lawyer, judge, court clerk, band Chief, private detective, security, forensic scientist, insurance sales, professor

- Canadian legal system (history and development)
- the Charter of Rights and Freedoms (development and issues)
- criminal law (mock trial and court processes)
- youth Justice Act
- civil Law (Family Law, Wills and Inheritance, Contract Law, Consumer Law, Real Property Law - Landlord and Tenant)
- current events

We will be exploring and employing the Big Six Historical concepts.

The emphasis is this course is on research, class presentations and careers in law. There will be several guest speakers and one or more field trips to court in Quesnel and Prince George and/or the RCMP building.

Social Justice 12 MSJ --12

Recommended Prerequisites: SS10

Note: This course meets the requirements for Graduation.

The aim of this course is to raise your awareness of social injustice, to enable you to analyze situations from a social justice perspective, and to provide you with the knowledge, skills, and an ethical framework to advocate for a socially just world. Emphasis of the course will be on research, presentations, and careers.

Careers in Social Justice: Counseling, Social Work, teaching, political science, law, Non-Government agencies, Indigenous studies

Social Justice 12 topics:

- women's rights in Canada and around the world
- LGTB rights (development and world situation)
- poverty
- racism
- the causes of injustice
- critical thinking and ethical reasoning skills to a variety of social justice issues
- acting in a socially just manner
- being a responsible agent of change, making positive contributions toward a socially just world

Earth Science 11 MESC-11

The big ideas of Earth Science 11 are:

- earth materials are changed as they cycle through the geosphere and are used as resources, with economic and environmental implications.
- plate tectonic theory explains the consequences of tectonic plate interactions.
- the transfer of energy through the atmosphere creates weather, and this transfer is affected by climate change.
- the distribution of water has a major influence on weather and climate.
- astronomy seeks to explain the origin and interactions of Earth and its solar system.

Life Sciences 11 MLFSC11

Recommended Prerequisites: Recommended C+ or better in Science 10.

The big ideas of Life Sciences 11 are:

- life is a result of interactions at the molecular and cellular levels
- evolution occurs at the population level
- organisms are grouped based on common characteristics

Science For Citizens 11 MSCCT11

Science for Citizens 11 prepares students for science in the work place and focuses on real-world, practical applications of science. Science for Citizens is a new course that **meets** the Science 11 graduation requirement, it **may not be** recognized by post-secondary schools as a science credit.

The big ideas of Science for Citizens 11 are:

- Scientific processes and knowledge inform our decisions and impact our daily lives (*possible topics include: personal and public health practices, science technologies, forensics*).
- Scientific knowledge can be used to develop procedures, techniques, and technologies that have implications for places of employment (*possible topics include: personal safety at home and at work, applications of materials science*).
- Scientific understanding enables humans to respond and adapt to changes locally and globally (*possible topics include: weather and climate, sustainability*).

WHAT'S NEXT?

- Next, we work on creating our timetable. We will try to have schedules out by late May/early June.
- You can **change your course requests at any time** between now and June – simply send your Counsellor an email and they will change it in our system
- After schedules are created, you can still **change your courses anytime** – the EARLIER THE BETTER! Just send your Counsellor an email and they will help you make changes.
- **June is the best time to make schedule changes** to ensure that you get the courses you want. Once courses are full, we put students on a waitlist
- **Counsellors are back at school the week before classes start (the week of August 29)**– email them to make an appointment.
